Abstract Why do youth in structurally disadvantaged neighborhoods experience lower levels of *informal social control*? To answer this question, we examined multi-level data from the Project on Human Development in Chicago Neighborhoods. Using hierarchical regression, we found that (1) neighborhood attachment & satisfaction with *police* contributed significantly to neighborhood levels of *informal social control*, (2) neighborhood attachment & satisfaction with *police* mediated a substantial portion of the association between *informal social control* & neighborhood levels of concentrated disadvantage & immigrant
